## Jelly Roll Dresden Options Supply List Teacher Anelie Belden

Using 1 package of a Jelly Roll with 40 fabrics or cutting $21 / 2$ " strips from fabrics can make a large variety of lap quilts. (Approx. 53 " by 63 ") There are many ways to lay out the blocks, combine the colors and change the borders to create a one of a kind Dresden Design. Following is a guideline of total yardage needed for a "General" Dresden Design.

| $2021 / 2 "$ strips in shades of Light or fabric contrasting the other 20 strips being used |  | Pair the strips together. <br> Sew with $1 / 4 "$ seam and press open. |

| Binding | 1/2 yard | 6 cuts @ $21 / 1 /{ }^{\text {" }}$ wide |

## You will also need the following:

- Jelly Roll Split Blade Pattern (Will bring to class)
- Thread to match for piecing
- Rotary cutting tools-Board, cutter and rulers
- Dresden Template by Fast2cut or Template plastic
- Basic sewing supplies such as Seam ripper, scissors (fabric and paper), straight pins, etc.
- Iron and small ironing surface
- Water Soluble Fabric glue
- Freezer Paper ( I will bring some to use)
- Starch ( I will have in class to use)
- Turning tool such as "Purple Thang"
- Fabric marking tool (Blue water soluble pen)

- Sewing machine in good working order-

Please knows how to use your machine.
Do before class: Cut background blocks. $48-61 / 2$ " by $61 / 2$ " squares
(DO NOT SEW TOGETHER- BRING SQUARES TO CLASS )

1) Pair strips from Jelly Roll together in a color combination that works for your fabrics.

Sew them together and press seams open. Cut the strips into $51 / 4$ " Lengths. You should get $7-8$ sections cut per strip.
Below are additional layouts that can be made using the same yardages for all of them.
